TIMES OF PRESSURE

- · Ways of handling cultural pressure
 - 1. Comply to act in accordance with the demands and wishes of another
 - 2. Condemn to pronounce judgment against
 - 3. Contrast to show differences
- Called to contrast (Matthew 5:14-16 NKJV)
 - 1. Living by a different standard
 - 2. Operating with a different spirit we were meant to shine

WHEN THE HEAT WAS ON (Daniel 3:13-18 NKJV)

- The three were unwilling to comply with the pressure
 - 1. They would not serve Babylonian gods
 - 2. They were unwilling to compromise the convictions of their heart
- · They displayed an uncommon courage in the face of pressure
 - 1. The risk was more than losing a job; it was losing their lives
 - 2. When given a second chance, they did not back up
- · They had confidence in the Living God
 - 1. A confident answer if you throw us in, God can and will deliver us
 - 2. Two variations of the phrase but if not
 - 3. King Nebuchadnezzar turned the heat up literally
- And God showed up (Daniel 3:21-25 NKJV)
 - 1. Three men went in bound but four walking around loose and unharmed
 - 2. King Neb walked back his decree

WHEN THE HEAT IS ON TODAY

- People of conviction
 - 1. An unshakable belief without the need of proof
 - 2. Our belief is in God's unchanging word and powerful Spirit (2 Timothy 3:13-15 NKJV)
- People of courage
 - 1. The willingness to act in accordance with what we believe
 - 2. Willingness to stand when cultural pressure is to bow culture, home, work, friendships, school
 - 3. Courage is a godly trait (Joshua 1:7 NKJV)
- People of confidence in God
 - 1. Confidence in the reality of the living God
 - 2. Confidence is God's willingness to be involved and help us (Hebrews 13:5-6 NKJV)
